Aboriginal cultural heritage means the tangible and intangible elements that are important to the Aboriginal people of the State and are recognised through social, spiritual, historical, scientific or aesthetic values, as part of Aboriginal tradition (s12(a) *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 2021*).

Our actions

We deliver on our commitment by:

- Integrating Aboriginal Cultural Heritage risk assessment and due diligence processes into decision making for projects and operational activities;
- Applying robust processes to manage our Aboriginal Cultural Heritage risks and identify opportunities for continual improvement of our activities;
- Engaging with key stakeholders on issues in a transparent and timely manner;
- Actively managing potential impacts by working with Traditional Owners and Knowledge Holders
 to identify and avoid Aboriginal Cultural Heritage through Site Avoidance Heritage Surveys,
 Heritage Monitoring, and other strategies as recommended by Traditional Owners and
 Knowledge Holders;
- Actively investigate and assess all possible options for new assets to ensure Aboriginal Cultural Heritage is avoided and protected wherever and whenever possible; and
- Taking all reasonable precautions to prevent Aboriginal Cultural Heritage incidents.
